



## ROBERT ANDERSON, 77

Robert Anderson, 77, longtime mayor and lifelong resident of International Falls, Minn., died unexpectedly Friday, Sept. 20, 2019.

He was born July 16, 1942, to parents Donald and Amber (Thompson) Anderson.

After graduating from Falls High School in 1960, Bob married Carol Engelking and had three children.

He was employed by Boise Cascade Corporation and after 51 years, retired in 2011 as the mill's Public Affairs Manager.

Inspired by his uncle Irv Anderson, a young Bob began a long civic and political hobby in his early 20s. Throughout his career, he served on the International Falls City Council, two times as mayor — including the current mayor, over 40 years as chairman of the Airport Commission (US DOT just announced the \$16 million grant for additional improvements to the Falls airport), Rainy Lake Medical Center, Hwy 53 All the Way Task Force, current chairman of the State Senate-appointed seat on the Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council, many years on the Fourth of July Celebration, League of MN Cities past president, Minnesota Forest Industry Council, Rainy River Community College Foundation, TruStar Federal Credit Union Board of Directors, and Elks Exalted Ruler.

In a recent interview, Bob summarized it best by saying, "I love my city having been born and raised here. Enjoy governance and helping others... My service to the city over the past 50 years has been a joy. My hope is that I have helped to make the city better in some small way because of my gift of time and my relationships with many of the business and political leaders throughout the state of Minnesota."

Bob always had a pocket full of International Falls City pins

ready to hand out. In the winter he sported a "Ice Box Days" wooden pin on his jacket just waiting for someone to ask the details.



When Bob wasn't attending meetings in and around Minnesota, he was attending his grandkids' activities and recently his great-granddaughter's first day of pre-school.

He enjoyed spending time at the Anderson Farm near Big Falls and deer hunting with relatives in his younger years always cooking and doing dishes. He loved to fly up to Trapper Bob's fish camp and host groups of customers.

He had two bucket list items that we are saddened will not happen. After Jenna graduated, he was hoping to see all the grandchildren's graduations from Air Force Academy (Erik), Sherman Chiropractic (Jenna), St. Catherine's (Emilee), UND (Jenna, Nick, Sydney) and to dance at their weddings.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Donald and Amber; brothers, Birket and Lee; and in-laws, John and Valeria Engelking.

He is survived by his wife Carol of 59 years; children, Robin (DeAnne), Cheri, and Rick (Tanya); grandchildren, Nick (Jahnai), Erik, Jenna (Andy), Sydney and Emilee; and great-granddaughter, Brynlee. He is also survived by brother, Don Jr.; sisters, Charlene (Kevin) and Arden; and nieces, nephews and cousins.

The family is thankful for the outpouring of love and friendship. Bob will be greatly missed.

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
## LOOKING BACK AT MOSQUITO MAYHEM

Because we can, that's why!

Not so in the metro area apparently. If the temperatures dip below zero for several days, with a little wind, all of a sudden it's too cold for man or beast to be out at the Winter Carnival so they retreat indoors. Really?

If one factors in all the hot air generated from the State Capitol, it should have warmed up St. Paul and the Winter Carnival to the point of being tolerable. Not so.

What has happened can be blamed on global warming. After all, everything else is.

We have become soft. We can't take the cold anymore.

Since the 1990s, outside of a few exceptions, we have had mild winters in Minnesota. Outside of the "polar vortex" conditions in early February, we have not experienced those bone-chilling, extremity-numbing cold spells that anyone over 50 experienced every winter in Minnesota.

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## ONE MAN'S PASSION FOR HOCKEY IMPACTS GENERATIONS OF YOUNG PEOPLE

Minnesota has long been considered the center of hockey in the United States, so perhaps it is not surprising that the man considered "the father of hockey" in Flagstaff hails from that state. His name is Jerry Caple and what started out for him as a childhood passion turned into a lifetime of promoting the sport, most notably in Northern Arizona. For his legacy of tireless devotion to hockey in the area, Northern Arizona University inducted him into its Athletic Hall of Fame last month, despite the fact that he was never technically associated with the NAU Athletic Department.

Gerald Caple grew up in the northern Minnesota town of International Falls, just a slap shot away from the Canadian border. His heroes growing up played hockey for the Fort Frances Canadians, an amateur club based just across the Rainy River, which borders the United States and Canada. "I grew up with the Canadians, walking across the river in the dead of winter to see them play on natural ice," he said. "That's kind of where my interest in hockey came from." He also played hockey on city league teams.

After high school, Caple enrolled at St. Olaf College in southern Minnesota. He majored in chemistry and also played some hockey on the varsity team, though he jokes that his presence on the team was not critical. "I was the type of hockey player that got put into the games when we were either far behind or far ahead."

After earning a doctorate degree in chemistry from Florida State University, Caple worked at Oregon State University for three years before accepting a position teaching chemistry at NAU in 1966. He would stay at NAU until 1994, teaching, serving as a pre-medical advisor and writing some 60 research papers during his tenure.

A half decade after arriving at NAU, Caple heard about a new ice rink that the City of Flagstaff was building, the Flagstaff Ice Arena [now known as Jay Lively Activity Center]. He knew some NAU students who enjoyed hockey and told them if they wanted to form a university hockey club, he would be glad to serve as their faculty advisor.

Thus, the NAU Hockey Club was formed. The group played pretty much any team that came calling, from other clubs to NCAA Division I teams and even the professional minor league Phoenix Roadrunners. Caple also led the effort to organize a youth hockey program in the area. In looking back, he recalled, "We introduced fans in Flagstaff to hockey at all levels of play, which I think really benefited the community."

The NAU Hockey Club also played a key role in the creation of one of NAU's iconic buildings. "A student poll at the time said students would not vote to fund a dome unless it contained ice. President [Lawrence] Walkup asked the hockey club to openly campaign for the dome, which we did," said Caple. "This helped to get the dome built." The team would eventually move to the dome to play its games.

The program was so successful that for five years, from 1981 to 1985, it was elevated from club NCAA Division I status. Several future NHL players, most notably Greg Adams, played for the team. The program was dropped in 1985 because of budgetary and other reasons, but brought back as the NAU Ice Jacks Club in 1991.


Caple left NAU in 1994 when he accepted a position as chair of the chemistry department at Pittsburgh State University in Kansas. He retired six years later at the age of 65, but within a year took on a "temporary" faculty position at the University of South Dakota, where he stayed for half a decade. He again taught chemistry, advised premedical students and was involved in the school's hockey club.

These days, Caple spends winters in Tucson and summers in Northern Minnesota, about 100 miles east of his boyhood home, on an isolated lake that is partially in Canada and partially in the United States. He still dabbles in chemistry, collecting samples for the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and serving on an advisory board for a commission that controls the water quality and quantity in the border waters. He also enjoys duck hunting and fly fishing, just like he did while living in Arizona when he took time from his teaching and hockey duties to escape to West Clear Creek, Bright Angel Creek in the Grand Canyon and the Colorado River.

## TRY A NEW WINTER ACTIVITY

One of my favorite accomplishments of 2019 was teaching myself how to make bread, and while not every loaf turned out perfect, every bake was worth it. Below is a recipe I tried recently in 2020 and my goal for the rest of the year is to try out as many new recipes as I can. Give it a shot and let me know how it went!

P.S. For me, it's not necessarily about how the bread tastes, it's about the smell that fills your home while it's baking. Be careful, it gets addictive.

### PITTAS

Makes 4 large or 6 medium pittas.

The key to a good pitta is to get your oven as hot as possible but at the same time not to over-bake the breads – you don't want them crispy. They're ready when a fleck of colour appears on the top. If your oven is glass-fronted, keep an eye on them without opening the door.

#### Ingredients:

300g strong white bread flour, plus extra for dusting

7g instant dried yeast

5g fine salt

1 tbsp dried oregano

About 200ml cold water

1 tbsp olive oil, plus extra for oiling

Tip the flour into a large bowl. Put the yeast to one side and the salt to the other. Add the oregano, then pour in three-quarters of the water and add the olive oil. Mix the ingredients together using the fingers of one hand, making sure you gather in all the flour from the side of the bowl. Add the remaining water a little at a time until all the flour is incorporated and you have a smooth, soft dough. (You may not need all the water or you may need a little more; it depends on the flour.)

Coat the work surface with a little olive oil then dip the dough onto it. Knead for 5-10 minutes until the dough is smooth and elastic.

Put the dough into a lightly oiled bowl. Cover and leave to rise until the dough has doubled in size. This will take at least an hour and can take 2-3 hours or longer, depending on the room temperature.

Meanwhile, heat your oven to 250C/Gas 10 (or as high as it will go) and put a baking stone or a large heavy-duty baking tray on the top shelf to heat up.

Tip the dough onto a lightly floured surface and knock back by folding the dough in on itself repeatedly until all the air is knocked out.

Divide the dough into 4 or 6 equal pieces and shape each one into a ball. Roll out each ball to an oval, 1cm thick.

Carefully take the hot trays from the oven and dust with flour. Lay the pittas on the trays and bake for 5-10 minutes until the breads begin to puff up and just start to colour. Wrap in a clean cloth to help keep them soft. Best eaten warm.
